


The Envirothon is a competition that is held once a year. Two teams per school are tested on their knowledge in soil and land use, aquatics, forestry, ecol-



Talent Search

Talent Search is a federal grant funded program that helps students explore education and career options. The program is open to everyone but is highly recommended for students who are the first generation in their family to go to college and have good grades, behavior, and attendance at school. The program is continuous through graduation and is intended to aid students in applying and being accepted to any type of post-secondary institution, whether it is a 2 or 4 year college, business, trade, or technology school. Talent Search is a great supplement to guidance services offered at Mahanoy Area.

The advisor is Miss Fritz, the Talent Search Academic Specialist. Entry to the program usually begins in 8th grade in Mrs. Kern's Career Education classes, but Miss Fritz has taken students based on guidance and teacher recommendation. In Talent Search, Miss Fritz takes students to career places to explore various fields of work and to post-secondary school campuses to expose them to public and private schooling options.

Students have said they benefited from this program and that they would be lost in the admissions and financial aid process without the additional help of being in Talent Search. They also gain good stress relief and study and interviewing and skills tips along the way.

It is extremely easy to join Student Council; however there is only one chance at joining. To be able to join a person can simply go to the administration office in the beginning of the year and write down his or her name on the ballot of new club members who want to join. Although it seems very easy there is a catch to the whole joining process. Once the students name is on the ballot, at the next meeting current members vote on eight newcomers that will be allowed into the club. The eight that receive the most votes are allowed into the club. There is also another catch to joining the club. The other catch is that a student has to be freshmen to be allowed in unless there aren't enough members in each grade and each grade is only allowed 8 members to represent student council. However, the senior grade is allowed 12 students to represent Student Council. Once a student is voted in though, he or she is automatically in the club for four years. A student can leave the club willingly or be forced to leave due to disciplinary reasons.

Well now students know how to join the club, the next thing that needs to be established is when and where the club meetings are held. The club meetings are usually held about
